The people we usually donate items to are so very grateful to anything we give them. For the most part all the projects they request or need is very general. That being said here's a little write up of each place we give to. If anyone knows of any organization that could use anything to donate.

Lauren Welch collects quilts to be added to bereavement baskets given to families who have lost a pregnancy. These can be any size from a lap quilt to a quilt for a twin bed. Any colors, patterns or quilting design can be donated.

Quilts are always welcome. In the past, the members of the guild have made guilts of various sizes. The most popular is a crib size or a large lap quilt. We will accept any size. I have been given quilts from 30"-60" X 36"-70". The bottom line is that anything we give them is greatly appreciated.

Project Linus provides blankets, both quilted and crocheted to children from the ages of 0-18 who are in the United States. These children have been traumatized, are seriously ill, or in great need. More information can be found on their website projectlinus.org.

Shannon Daley Memorial fund was started to honor Shannon who passed away at four months old from cardiac issues. Twice a year, needy children are nominated to receive a quilt. The gentleman who runs this chapter will let us know: 1. How many quilts/blankets are needed. 2. The ages and sex of the children that has been chosen and the back story of these

children. The size of the quilt doesn't seem to matter as I have donated just about every size to him. Making them age appropriate and gender appropriate seem to be the general idea of the donation. He is extremely grateful for anything we send his way.

Placemats are usually donated to Meals-on-Wheels. They don't require any specific size. They take anything and everything I bring them. So, whatever you can or want to make from your stash is great.

Pillowcases should be standard size. The fabric can range from children's to adult themed. These would be distributed to Hunterdon Medical Center +/or Morristown Goryeb Children's Hospital.
